It is believed (no evidence) that calming (slowing down) the brain and nerve signals will indirectly calm the gastrointestinal track (stomach and intestines) causing an antispasmodic effect There is no scientific evidence that exist to prove that this is true.

The AMA Drug Evaluation essentially states that sedatives and tranquilizers

mixed with antispasmodics, is irrational (stupid) and do not recommend using them.

The drug combination interactions are undesired (wrong). Aside from this, the

ingredients sometimes added such as barbiturates (a sedative) are addicting.

The long-term use causes addiction to the drug or the product Addiction to the

product helps provide a steady income for the pharmaceutical (prescription) drug pushers.
